

## Better Together Ephesians 1:1-2

**Introduction of Paul and the Ephesians:** Learn from the writer and recipients of this letter how to live better together.

Our Calling: What does it look like when we live better together? Ephesians 1:15-16

"I too having heard of the faith in the Lord Jesus which exists among you and your love for all the saints, do not cease giving thanks for you, while making mention of you in my prayers"

Six essential qualities for a healthy relationship: Acts 20:17-37

- Investment of time (v.18)
- Humility of heart (v.19)
- Open and authentic with tears and trials (v.19-20, 23)
- Communicate truth to each other, no deceit (v.21, 27-31)
- Selfless motivation (v.33-35)
- Emotional bond (v.37-38)

Our Commitment: We are better together so we do not lose heart from suffering. Ephesians

3:1. 13-21: 4:1: 6:20: Acts 28:22-24

"For this reason I, Paul, the prisoner of Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles." Ephesians 3:1

"Therefore I ask you not to lose heart at my tribulations on your behalf, for they are your glory." Ephesians 3:13

Our Challenge: Be warned – we can do good works with good doctrine but fall out of love with the Lord and others.

"But I have this against you, that you have left your first love." Revelation 2:2-5

Our Character: Life is better together when we unite with one another in attitude, heart and deed. Ephesians 4:1-3, 15-16

"...walk in a manner worthy of the calling with which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, showing tolerance for one another in love"

## **Digging Deeper:**

Paul wrote Ephesians to the believers in Ephesus in what was called Asia Minor in that day. Today we can visit this location in Turkey. There was a strong bond created between Paul and the Ephesians. Paul's ministry to Ephesus caused a dramatic change in the lifestyle of those people as you can read in Acts 19. Even the economy changed because people turned from worshiping idols which caused the silversmith Demetrius to lose money and the city rioted.

## LifeGroup Discussion:

When Paul departed from the Ephesians, you can observe the deep emotional and spiritual bond between Paul and the leaders in Acts 20:17-31. During that time of openness with the elders, notice how Paul connected with them as they served together in Acts 20:19. Three key words are "humility," "tears," and "trials." These express the kind of connection that allows a relationship to grow deeply and healthy. Let's take a look at them.

**Humility**: No one ever gets an award, notoriety or prestige for humility. But you cannot have a healthy relationship with another person without humility. Use the following contrast of Pride and Humility to evaluate where you can grow. Put a check in each box that best describes you.

Paul also was with them in **tears**. How do you feel when you shed tears before other people? Read about the tears of Jesus in John 11:35-38. What did the people think when they saw Jesus cry? What does it reveal about His heart for people in need?

Finally, Paul connected with the elders in "trials." (Acts 20:19) Suffering and struggling with people will cause the relationship to grow open and deep. How has suffering in your life deepened your relationships?

What relationships do you want to connect with as Paul did with the Ephesians? What stands out to you as an area of strength in your life? What area can you invest more time in?

Based on Paul's connection with the Ephesians, how and where do you see this theme of "better together" with other people at work in your life? What relationships can grow as a result of this emphasis?

Paul's relationships included humility, tears and trials. Which of these marks your relationships these days? In what ways?
