


Your Former Life Galatians 1:11-24

"For I neither received it from man, nor was I taught it, but I received it through a revelation of Jesus Christ."
Galatians 1:12



How God's story shapes your life Galatians 1:13-24

- Your story before Jesus (Galatians 1:13-14)
 - There's nothing you can do to make Him love you less
 "For you have heard of <u>my former manner of life</u> in Judaism, how I used to persecute the church of God beyond measure and tried to destroy it..." Galatians 1:13
 - There's nothing you can do to make Him love you more
 "...and I was advancing in Judaism beyond many of my contemporaries among my countrymen, being more extremely
 zealous for my ancestral traditions." Galatians 1:14

The horrible things I've done — The righteous things I've done —

Your story of conversion (Galatians 1:15-16)

"But when **God**, who had **set me apart** even from my mother's womb and **called** me through His grace, was <u>pleased</u> to **reveal** His Son in me <u>so that</u> I might preach Him among the Gentiles..." Galatians 1:15-16

- God "set him apart" at birth Ephesians 1:3, 4
- God "called him" by His grace 1 Timothy 1:12-17
- God "revealed Jesus" in him Acts 9:1-9; 4:12
- Your story with Jesus (Galatians 1:16-23)

"He who once persecuted us is now preaching the faith which he once tried to destroy." Galatians 1:23

- Your story needs sanctification (v.16-17)
- Your story needs community (v.18-22)
- Your story needs to be shared (v.23)

Your story has changed to give God glory Galatians 1:24

"And they were glorifying God because of me." Galatians 1:24

- Your story has power, tell it!
 - "And they overcame him because of the blood of the Lamb and **because of the word of their testimony**, and they did not love their life even when faced with death." Revelation 12:11
- This is about God, not us

"Not to us, O Lord, not to us, but to Your name give glory because of Your lovingkindness, because of Your truth." Psalm 115:1

How to Prepare and Tell Your Story

(Taken from CRU "How to Prepare and Tell Your Story")

Before I Accepted Christ (or gave Him complete control)

- 1. What was my life like that will relate most to the non-Christian?
- 2. What did my life revolve around the most? What did I get my security or happiness from?
- 3. How did those areas begin to let me down?

How I Received Christ (or gave Him complete control)

- 1. When was the first time I heard the gospel? (Or when was I exposed to dynamic Christianity)
- 2. What were my initial reactions?
- 3. When did my attitude begin to turn around? Why?
- 4. What were the final struggles that went through my mind just before I accepted Christ?
- 5. Why did I go ahead and accept Christ?

After I Accepted Christ (or gave Him complete control)

- 1. Specific changes and illustrations about the changes Christ has made:
- 2. Why am I motivated differently?

Helpful Hints

- 1. Write the way you speak; make the testimony yours.
- 2. Practice this over and over until it becomes natural.
- 3. Shoot for short -- 3 minutes. Something you can put into a conversation without it becoming a monologue.

An example: Look at Paul's testimony as you consider how to tell your story.

His life before (Acts 22:1-5)

- 1. Paul describes what he thought and did before he became a believer.
- 2. Your goal: to give specific, yet appropriate, examples of what your life was like (attitudes, needs, problems) before Christ.
- 3. Remember that examples you give will establish you as a credible witness in the minds of non-Christians. However, avoid a religious focus. (You want to make it about Jesus and your need for Him.) Don't spend a great amount of time talking about church activities or denominations before your life began to change. Likewise, avoid being explicit and sensational in speaking of drugs, immorality, crime or drunkenness.

How (Acts 22:6-11)

- 1. Paul explained how he became a believer.
- 2. Your goal: to allow the listener to walk away with a clear understanding of how you became a Christian and how he or she can trust Christ as the payment for their sins.
- 3. Be careful not to use clichés and church language. Talk in terms they'll understand.

After (Acts 22:12-21)

- 1. Paul explained how becoming a believer changed his life.
- 2. Your goal: to explain specific ways Christ has changed your life -- to show that having Christ in your life really does make a difference!
- 3. Avoid using general statements such as "I have so much peace now." Be specific. It is the Holy Spirit's responsibility to draw someone to Christ, but you want to communicate your story in such a way to show the listener that your life is different and more meaningful with Christ.
